





- · We will keep your child safe




What can we expect from you?

What is the Foundation Stage?

The Foundation Stage is the stage of education for children from the age of three to the end of the Reception year. It is based on the recognition that children learn best through planned purposeful play, creating and thinking and active learning. It ends at the end of the Reception year where children are assessed against 17 aspects of learning in the Foundation Stage Profile. It is hoped that at the end of the year each child will gain a Good Level of Development, and achieve 'expected' at each level.




There are four *specific* areas of learning, through which the three prime areas are strengthened and applied.






Literacy



A day in the life of...

The day begins with 'busy learning', a task to support fine motor control.

Over the morning, there will be a phonics session, reading session and maths session. At the outset of the year, these sessions are short and practical.

We join the rest of the school for playtime at 10.30 and for lunch at 12.

The afternoon will begin with a focus and the learning opportunities the children then have, are often linked to this focus. The resources in the classroom are usually available for the children to choose from, so they can develop their own ideas and interests.

We end our day with collective worship with the whole school, from the Autumn half term.


It would be a great help to us if your child was encouraged to do these things before starting school:

Please choose velcro fastening shoes




Starting arrangements

- Monday 4th September 45 minute drop in session stay and play with your child in the classroom. You will be able to sign up for a time. Please come to the main office.
- Tuesday 5th and Wednesday 6th September half of the children will come in 9:30am until 11:30am and half will come in 1pm until 3pm. Please see your pack for when your child is invited. Please come to the gate in the car park.
- Thursday 7th All children in 8:50am until 12noon
- Friday 8th September All children in 8:50am to 1:15pm stay for lunch
- From Monday 11th September All children in full time unless there is a need to stagger further. We do try to be flexible and if you feel your child is not ready, we are happy to discuss alternative arrangements with you.
